The Moller Pipe Organ, heard in this recording, is a gift from the late Demetrios Pappas. The organ was designed by Newton Pashley, Anna M. Counelis and Dr. Tikey Zes, for the specific musical requirements of the Ascension Greek Orthodox Church. It is a two manual organ with eight ranks, unified, and one chamber.

The Schulmerich Chime Carillons is a gift from Thomas Lagios.

COMMEMORATING THE 35TH ANNIVERSARY OF "EXCERPTS FROM HOLY WEEK AND EASTER"

In May of 1991, Senator Nicholas C. Petris delivered the eulogy at my father Perecles Peter Phillips' funeral service. When reflecting about a word that would best describe "Perry," Senator Petris proclaimed with affection that he was "restless!" This word captured the very essence of his being. A devoted man of our Orthodox faith and a visionary, his life's work was rewarded when he was bestowed an Archon of the Order of St. Andrew.

It is with that "restless" spirit that I offer "Holy Week and Easter Excerpts", the CD and digital version of the 1979 recording "Excerpts from Holy Week and Easter", in commemoration of its 35th anniversary. A monumental undertaking at the time, this two-CD set remains inspirational and revolutionary today. Recorded from the choir loft at the Greek Orthodox Church of the Ascension (now Ascension Cathedral) in Oakland, California, it was important to my father to capture the mystical sound of our house of worship in spite of the airplanes that occasionally flew overhead and interrupted the recording sessions.

In 1978, his enthusiasm to offer a Women's Byzantine Chant Choir for the entire Holy Tuesday service was contagious and sparked a tradition that has continued each year since with the women of the Ascension Liturgical Choir. When he adapted the Holy Saturday morning service to include the St. Romanos Children's Choir, his commitment to inspire and involve the next generation was realized. This recording project was intended "solely as an offering to God's Most Holy Orthodox Church."

Thanks to a generous gift from Mrs. Helen Phillips Nickols in memory of her brother Perry and husband Alex N. Nickols, a magnificent tenor who's voice inspired many of Dr. Frank Desby's Liturgical compositions, these wonderful recordings have a new global life in this age of digital downloads and Internet communication. May you enjoy this musical treasure year after year as we celebrate Holy Week and Easter.

REFLECTIONS AND REMEMBRANCES

Thirty-five years ago, I was privileged and blessed to have taken part in a great musical undertaking. The recording "Excerpts from Holy Week and Easter" was certainly a turning point in my life. It set the stage for what was about to come for me musically in the future.

Perry Phillips, of blessed memory, will be remembered for his great spirituality and his undying enthusiasm, which shines brightly in this recording, but mostly for his foresight in understanding what was deeply enriching to the human experience through our hymnography.

There are too many memories to share here about this recording, which has stood the test of time and continues to be ahead of its time in its form and content. The recording sessions were long, but every moment of them was exciting and as we sang the many hymns and responses of Holy Week and Easter, one felt that we were actually taking part in those services at the time we recorded them. In fact, because the sessions were long, we actually ended up recording the music for Easter (Defte Lavete Fos, Christos Anesti) precisely at midnight. I have often thought back to that beautiful memory and I am amazed at the divine guidance that led us through these recording sessions.

Perry was a mentor, a grand motivator and a great friend. His voice and teachings are deeply engrained in my musical church life and his inspired outlook is what continues to drive my musical output even today. Perry had a great faith in me when he challenged me with the task of composing and arranging some of the hymns and responses you will hear on this recording. I was only 19-years old at the time and had only been writing choral music for the church for a little under five years, but Perry had a great unwavering faith in me to be able to accomplish the task.

Dr. Frank Desby, of blessed memory, was another mentor and musical guiding force in my life. He was instrumental in sharing his knowledge and interpretation of his music with the choir when he paid us a visit during a rehearsal prior to the recording of the music.

Most of all, I remember fondly all of the wonderful people who made up the Ascension Liturgical Choir at that time. This recording was a labor of love for everyone who took part in the making of it and I will always look back at this recording as a living testament of our faith.

In the course of our lifetimes in the Greek Orthodox Church, certain individuals [be they laymen, laywomen, or priests] stand out because of their extraordinary vision, traits, and skills.

Such a person was Perecles P. Phillips.
Following his military service during World
War II, he became one of "The Greatest
Generation" as described by journalist, Tom
Brokaw. He passionately and unselfishly
dedicated himself to the advancement of our
Greek Orthodox faith through its music and
many other traditions and practices.

He was a man of many ideas who would creatively construct them into grand projects. He had an uncanny ability to identify talented individuals, and then encourage and convince them to participate in a worthy undertaking.

And before us, is only one of the fruits of his labors. More than 35 years ago, he thought carefully about the Holy Week and Easter Services of our faith. His thoughts resulted in the formation of a youth choir, and a women's and men's choir to appropriately render the message of the specific Holy Week Service. He visualized this recording to be useful for "shut-ins" and an educational aid for all – a goal which continues to be fulfilled.

His vision also resulted in a most successful Saturday Morning Service, which he composed and arranged for youth choirs. The youth were also recruited to present the many biblical readings and prophecies – a great benefit for the young participants (including my own sons) who, as a result, were "turned-on" to our faith.

All of Perry's endeavors came with much personal and family sacrifice of time, service, and treasure. We are all grateful.

Being a part of this recording was a privilege. We all worked many hours with the recording engineer and his equipment in a large truck parked between the educational building and the community center building. The recording engineer communicated with Perry via an intercom from the truck to the choir loft. At one point, we all heard the engineer call out, "Perry, stop handling the change in your pocket – the sound is recording." We all had a healthy laugh – a welcome relief for the moment.

This recording still stands as a testament to Perry's "faith and good works" – and also his faith in his co-workers in whom he "brought out the best."

Holy Week and Easter at the Greek Orthodox Church of the Ascension

He arrived in Oakland in 1926 and began a musical ministry that was to span 28 years. He was a man who chanted the music of our Most Holy Church with exquisite pride and dignity. God had bestowed upon him a magnificent bass-baritone voice. And that voice was heard only, and over a period of more than 50 years, when he chanted the hymns of his church. His name was Athanasios Alambakos and he was born in Philiatra, Greece around 1873. In Philiatra, he studied, and sang, with the Protopsalti (First Cantor) Basilios Albanis. He then went to Athens where he entered the Cantoral School directed by the noted Byzantine musician and cantor John Theodore Sakellaridis. God then ordained that he migrate to the United States.

Forty-two years ago [1937], Alambakos gathered a small group of Altar Boys, myself among them, and patiently began the task of teaching them the music of the Divine Liturgy, Matins and other services. The Ascension Liturgical Choir is directly descended from that humble beginning.

On September 23, 1954, while chanting the music of the Divine Liturgy, Athanasios Alambakos' musical ministry on this earth ended abruptly. God had chosen that moment to call Alambakos to His Eternal Kingdom. Athanasios Alambakos, His God given voice and the message he brought us through the hymns of our Most Holy Church, has not been forgotten. Every hymn, and reading, projected this Holy Cantor's unshakable belief in the Resurrected Christ. Never was this belief more evident than during Holy Week and Easter.

Today, Holy Week and Easter services are the crowning jewels in the Liturgical year of the Ascension Parish, as they were when Alambakos first transmitted their significance. The tradition he established was continued by the first, and succeeding choir directors of our parish. From Constance Bales Dagres to Dawn Rostain, Helen Gonis, Elleny Satsonis Mahoney, Tula Marakas Gallanes, John Reckas, Thomas Pallad, Dr. Tikey Zes, Edward Godoshian and Peter Cardiasmenos, the Ascension Liturgical

Choir has been blessed with dedicated directors. Each director left with us a significant mark.

Anna Marakas Counelis, who served with most of the aforementioned directors, is an accomplished pipe organist and pianist. Beyond that, she is a church musician in every sense of the word. Her total understanding of the service of our Most Holy Orthodox Church is evidenced every time she is seated at the console. Her sensitivity, for music and text, and a lifetime of dedication cannot be described in a few short words. She is "one of a kind."

This commemorative album is intended solely as an offering to God's Most Holy Orthodox Church. All of the choirs, you are about to hear, participate in the Holy Week and Easter Services. The core of the Women's, Men's and Byzantine Chant choirs emanate from the Liturgical Choir and are augmented by other members of our parish for the Holy Week and Easter services and other services throughout the year. There are 13 services throughout the week, from the Palm Sunday Liturgy to the Easter Sunday Vespers (Vespers of Love), in which one of these five choirs participate.

The four excerpts presented here focus on the following:

Christ's parable of the five wise and five unwise virgins, Mary Magdalene's repentance and Judas Iscariot's betrayal of Christ (Holy Tuesday Evening).

Christ's crucifixion and his bearing the Cross along the narrow road (Dolorous Way) to the hill known as "Golgotha." (Holy Thursday Evening).

God's deliverance of the Three Youths – Shadrach (Ananias), Meshach (Mishael) and Abednego (Azarias) – from Nebuchadnezzar's fiery furnace. (Holy Saturday Morning Vesper and Liturgy of St. Basil the Great – often called the "Mikri Anastasi," or, "Little Resurrection").

The pronouncement of Christ's Glorious Resurrection (Resurrection Matins).

Any attempt, on my part, to detail what you are about to hear would be both meager and redundant. Some 1.5 millennia have passed since the early hymnographers devoted their entire lives to the exaltation of God and His Christ in poetry and music. What they recorded, to this day, tells the story far better than any of us – who have inherited their God inspired message in music – could ever transmit.

Let us rejoice in return for the days wherein Thou didst afflict us, the years wherein we saw evil.

A woman sinful and impure drew near to Thee, O Saviour, and poured out tears upon Thy feet proclaiming Thy passion. How can I gaze on Thee, O Master? Thou indeed hast come to save the harlot. Thou Who didst raise Lazarus from the tomb after four days, raise me, who is dying, out of the abyss; receive me, O Lord, in my misery, and save me.

She who was in despair on account of her life, gained knowledge by bringing myrrh and drawing near to Thee she cried: Thou Who was born of a Virgin, she besought Thee, her tears equaling her past deeds, and she said: Loose my debt, as I unloose my tresses; bless her who loves Thee, and is justly hated, and who as the companion of publicans hails Thee, O Merciful, Doer of Good.

Praise Him with the sound of the trumpet; praise Him upon the lute and harp.

With the precious myrrh the harlot mixed her tears, and poured it out upon Thy sacred feet, fervently embracing them. Thou didst at once justify her, do Thou also bestow on us forgiveness and save us, O thou Who didst suffer for us.

Praise Him with cymbals and dances; praise Him with stringed instruments and organs.

When the woman who was a sinner was offering the myrrh, then the disciple was making terms with the lawless men; she rejoiced in emptying out that which was all-precious; he hastened to sell Him, Who was above all price; she recognized the Master, he severed himself from the Master; she was set free, and Judas became a slave of the enemy. Fearful is the rashness! Great is the penitence! This

do Thou, O Saviour, grant to me O Thou Who didst suffer for us, save us.

Praise Him upon the well-tuned cymbals. Praise Him upon the loud cymbals. Let every thing that hath breath praise the Lord.

O misery of Judas! He saw the harlot embracing the feet, and himself with guile meditated the kiss of treachery. She unloosed her tresses, and he bound himself with wrath, bringing instead of myrrh, his foul wickedness; for envy knows not even to appreciate its own advantage. O misery of Judas! From this, O God, deliver our souls.

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.

The woman who was a sinner hastened to the market, that she might purchase precious myrrh and anoint the Doer of Good. To the myrrh-seller she cried: Give me the myrrh that even I may anoint Him, Who has wiped away all my sins.
